If you are interested in becoming a Field Interviewer on the Population Assessment of Tobacco and Health Study, also called the PATH Study, this video will provide a brief overview of the position. The PATH Study examines tobacco and nicotine use and its impact on the health of people in the United States.

This year, the PATH Study interviewers will screen over 350,000 households and conduct interviews with tens of thousands of adults and youth.

As a Field Interviewer for the PATH Study, you'll play a vital role in collecting meaningful data on health, tobacco and nicotine use.

Using a laptop, you'll accurately record participant responses while closely following study protocols.

Interviewers should be prepared to carry approximately 20 pounds of materials, including a Westat laptop and other study essentials, throughout their field assignments.

Your responsibilities will include:

- Conducting Door-to Door Outreach at assigned addresses.
- Conducting brief Eligibility Screenings to determine if household members qualify to participate in the Study.
- Conducting In-Person Interviews with selected participants in their residences.

PATH Study interviewers are self-motivated, confident about knocking on doors to introduce the study, comfortable using a laptop, and value the opportunity to engage with people of all cultures and backgrounds. This is a part-time position, averaging 20 hours a week, mostly evenings and weekends. There is no fixed schedule, but interviewers are expected to work consistently for at least four hours at a time, on different days of the week, and at varying times of the day. Successful completion of an extensive virtual training on all aspects of the job, is required. Training is approximately 20–25 hour per week, for 3 weeks prior to the start of data collection.
